All the way from June through September, people from all parts of North America will be flocking to South America on various mission teams. Some will be working on construction projects, some will be focusing on ministerial outreach, but whatever their trip's goals, it's sure to be a great time!

The first team to visit this summer (summer for North America, winter for South America), was the international youth ministries team led by Charlie and Amaris Scruggs in June. This team was called the Canopy Project with people from Virginia, Tennessee, and California. The main purpose of the group was to build an amphitheater at the Tierra Prometida campground in Carapeguá. However, they also took a weekend to provide youth ministry training to all youth workers in Paraguay. Stephen and I were asked to help provide music for the weekend, which included the training seminar, a regional youth service, and a regional Sunday morning church service to end the event. Once again, we asked on our good friends Cristian and Gabriel Lopez to help with guitar and drums, and different team members helped sing and play bass. Whether it's the local people from Paraguay or a mission team coming to help, I am always amazed and grateful for the opportunities I have to meet so many fantastic people I never would have met otherwise.

After several struggles and battles, we were able to officially turn in all of our paperwork in December 2016. When we submitted everything we were told it would be 90 days until we received our cards. It short we had to wait six months. At one point, the immigrations office called me to say I needed an extra interpol document that apparently Stephen did not need. I also had to go to the U.S. Embassy to get paperwork declaring that my married name and maiden name were the same person. I think it's funny how Stephen didn't have to do anything extra but I needed all these other docuemnts that were not on the application list. ## Paraguay Fun Fact



Paraguay recently made the national news with featured stories on CNN, BBC, and the NY Times. What happened?

In April, Paraguay experienced some slight political unrest. The current president, Horacio Cartes, made a play to seek a second term in office, something that is currently prohibited by the Paraguayan constitution. Right now, Paraguayan presidents are limited to serving a single five year term. Until 1989, Paraguay was ruled by a dictatorship, and the single term rule was made in hopes of preventing another dictator rising to power. When opposition forces found out that Cartes

was trying to change the law, many people took to the streets in riot. The congressional building was set afire, and police took to the streets decked out in full riot gear, using rubber bullets and water cannons to disperse the angry mob. One person was killed in the riot, which sparked even more outrage. Cartes has since said he will no longer seek a second term, but a lot of people are still on alert for fear another authoritative regime will come to power.
