

Not long after Stephen and I moved to Quyquyho, we started a new Saturday night youth service based out the Hogar El Puente (The Bridge Children's Home). This is an all-female orphanage with girls ranging from around seven years old all the way up to eighteen. Back in North Carolina, Stephen and I were the youth directors for our local church for two years, so we had experience working with youth to begin with. However, it's a little different trying to do a youth service in a foreign language. At first, our Spanish skills were a little tricky, but with time we've gotten better and we don't stumble over our words so much anymore. Two weeks ago, we started a series on the life of Christ that will continue all the way up to Easter. We are talking about his birth, life, ministry, death, and resurrection, while at the same time discussing Old Testament prophecies that talk about the signs of the coming Messiah. Other than bible studies, we of course have a lot of fun at youth service. The above picture is a game where the girls split into teams and had to pry apart a frozen t-shirt. Every team member then had to put the t-shirt on, and the first group to have every member wear the frozen shirt won. Sometimes after service, the girls like to gather round Stephen's piano and have an impromptu singa-long while he plays. The girls seem to always enjoy youth service and we like hanging out with them just as much.



### **Upcoming Mission Trips to Paraguay**



With Spring already sprung, many churches in the United States are gearing up to send mission teams to many different parts of the world. I have a special kind of love for the mission trip experice. It's how I was introduced to many different cultures and people. It's how I came to Paraguay for the first time and met my husband Stephen. It's because of mission trips that I'm here in Paraguay right now, typing this newsletter. For the past few weeks, Stephen and I have been meeting with Dan Miller every Monday night to discuss planning and details for several different teams that will be coming to Paraguay during the summer months. First, we have a group headed up by COGOP International Youth Minitires that will be bringing a group of approximately 30 people in June to build an ampitheatre on the church campground property. In July, a group of

17 people will coming from North Carolina to do ministry outreach and to build a couple of houses for impoverished families in the area. Finally, from August to September there will be about fifty different people coming from Michigan and Canada to Paraguay. Their goal will be to build thirty houses over the course of this time period, along with building a dinning hall and kitchen for a local school, as well as a trade school to be housed on the campground property. With all these different groups scheduled to come, Stephen and I are sure to have a busy couple of months, but we are excited to be a part of all the great things happening in Paraguay, and we are prepared to help faciliate these teams as much as we can.

#### What's so unique about the Paraguayan Flag?

Adopted in 1842, Paraguay's flag is one of the few in the world to have different emblems on its obverse (front) and reverse (back) sides. Inspired by the French flag as a sign of liberty and freedom, the obverse side of the Parguayan flag displays the country's coat of arms, while the reverse boasts the seal of the national treasury.
